The main highlight was the sighting of two different sapsuckers, the Red-breasted on Arden Rd. and the Red-naped in Tournament Park. Annette had come early and staked them out. Not everyone saw the Red-breasted, but we all had incredibly good views of the Red-naped. Quite the sight seeing it making those holes they make. The Snowy Egret was still there at the same pond as last week – always glad to get one of those. Just lots of good

birds. We also welcomed a new walker, Tia Hogan, and also welcomed the return of my son Travis. He was particularly happy to see the Red-naped Sapsucker, but he did miss the Re-breasted, which, unfortunately, is the one he needs to be a new life bird. Maybe next week. Great walk!
